Mindfulness Mobile App to Reduce Adolescent Substance Use

Major aims: to develop and test the feasibility of a smart phone application (app) intervention prototype that would help adolescent substance users reduce or quit their substance use. The program, entitled MyMUSE, will apply a mindfulness approach as the guiding framework for the intervention; the program will be evaluated with a high risk group of adolescents that are involved in the juvenile justice system. The proposed program will be the only mobile app specifically for adolescent substance use; there is high level of need for the program both as an adjunct to existing treatments and for use in the juvenile justice system.

Treating Youths with PTSD and Conduct Problems

The purpose of this project is to enhance the PI's skills and knowledge in intervention research methodology with the ultimate goal of developing an independent research program. The training goals are to provide specialized instruction and mentoring in (1) conducting clinical trials, (2) developing interventions for the integrated treatment of comorbid PTSD symptoms and conduct problems, (3) advanced statistical training in topics central to intervention research, and (4) training in the ethical conduct of research. Existing assessments and interventions for treating PTSD will be adapted for treating PTSD symptoms in female youths with comorbid conduct problems. The feasibility of the integrated intervention protocol will be tested on a small sample of female youths with comorbid PTSD symptoms and conduct problems, and a small-scale pilot intervention trial will test the protocol. Findings will be used to provide an effect-size estimate for the integrated treatment of comorbid PTSD symptoms and conduct problems in female youths. An R01 application to expand this research to larger, more diverse samples will be submitted.

Preventing Problems for Girls in Foster Care

The major goals of this project were as follows: (1) to develop and implement a multicomponent preventative intervention model for 10-/11-year-old girls beginning in the summer before entry into sixth grade and continuing throughout the school year; (2) to test the effects of early adversity (e.g., parent psychopathology, family transitions, low IQ, sexual/physical abuse, childhood behavioral problems, temperamental difficulty, and early menses) on proximal outcomes (e.g., behavioral problems, placement stability, school achievement, social support, affiliation with prosocial female peers, and relational aggression); (3) to test the effectiveness of the intervention on proximal and longer term outcomes; and (4) to explore the effects of potential mediating variables on the association between group assignment and proximal and longer term outcomes.
